

Both: black

Spanish only: grey

English only: bold & highlighted

Notes:

- All the shared Spanish vowels are actually diphthongs in English: e1 (day), i1 (tea), o0 (hotel), u0 (zoo).
- English has 3 non-tense vowel diphthongs: at (I), 5t (boy), at (brown)
- When a syllable ends in r, the vowel gets "r-colored" or "r-controlled": ε/δ (assert, dinner), α (star, car), ν (store, war)
- The vowel $\mathfrak o$ (caught, Dawn) is increasingly rare in the US, but $\mathfrak o$ is used in Chicagoland. Others use $\mathfrak o$ (cot, Don) instead of $\mathfrak o$.
- Botoga Spanish speakers often use I instead of i
